Greetings from the Vicarage

It has been discovered that there are at least 10,000 more galaxies than we thought there were before. That's like 10,000 worlds. That's a lot of matter out there in space. I don't know about you but I find it completely impossible to relate to that concept. Our world seems almost too much to contemplate.

But is there some way that this abstract, other-worldly information relates to you and me? I believe there is. It relates, believe it or not to our community. The biggest picture of all is that God created the universe so that He would have a people to live with. God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit existed in perfect and complete unity and love before time or matter was created. The sheer number of galaxies and planets tells us at the very least that our God is extravagantly and limitlessly creative.

God, whose very identity is relationship, wanted to share the love, the completeness and the joy that He had. In order to share this love He needed to create beings that were in some ways like him, with a personality and a will to choose to love. Jesus said: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: Love your neighbour as yourself."

Jesus said that this principal of love and this practice of loving matters more than all other commandments. Everything else found in the Old Testament hangs on, is related to and lesser than this first principal. It contains the revelation of how we were created, how we rebelled, and, in the story that started with Abraham, how we were to be reclaimed and redeemed by God in Christ.

Loving God and loving people is what happens when we apply and live out God's Word. Faith and hope are extremely important things, but in the end love is what will remain eternally.

Pentecost/Whit Sunday - the birthday of the Church

Pentecost took place on the well established Jewish festival of Firstfruits, which was observed at the beginning of the wheat harvest. It was exactly 50 days after the Passover, the time of Jesus' crucifixion.



A feast day to celebrate the country's wheat harvest does not sound exactly world-changing, but that year, it became one of the most important days in world history. For Pentecost was the day that Jesus sent the Holy Spirit - the day the Church was born. Jesus had told his apostles that something big was going to happen, and that they were to wait for it in Jerusalem, instead of returning to Galilee. So the apostles and disciples waited in Jerusalem, praying together for several days. On that fateful morning there was suddenly the sound as of a mighty rushing wind. Tongues of flame flickered on their heads, and they began to praise God in many tongues – to the astonishment of those who heard them.

Peter gave the first ever sermon of the Christian church that morning: proclaiming Jesus was the Messiah. His boldness in the face of possible death was in marked contrast to the man who had denied Jesus 50 days before. And 3,000 people responded, were converted, and were baptised. How's that for fast church growth!

Community Councils

Dale CC

Meeting 16th April, 2013.

Among items discussed at the meeting:

HPMCZ Consultation – it is understood that the Stakeholder Focus Group and the Welsh Assembly Government “Task and Finish” Group have completed their deliberations and are now in the process of finalising their reports and recommendations to the (new) Minister.

These should be submitted to him before the end of April, 2013 and it is hoped that the Minister’s decision will be published soon afterwards. The Community Council continues to monitor the position closely.

Sewerage plant issues – residents may be aware that the issues affecting the sewerage plant in Dale were raised by Mr Paul Davies AM at ministerial Question Time in the Sennedd. The Minister has asked for details of the problems and the Community Council has provided the necessary information to Mr Davies AM so that he can pass it to the Minister.

Meanwhile, the Community Council has asked the water industry regulators to investigate the problems and the Consumer Council for Water have confirmed that they will undertake an investigation. The Community Council will monitor the progress of these investigations and meanwhile they are pressing Dwr Cymru, the County Council and Environment Agency Wales to ensure that all steps necessary are taken to ensure that the plant does not let us down – again – in the course of the tourism season.

Rave Watch! – it is that time of year again! Residents are reminded to be alert and to note and report suspicious activity to the police – this includes people looking at land and testing hedges; unusual vehicles driving slowly or stopping in isolated areas; gatherings of people in and around beaches, vacant land or lay-bys; damage to facilities

such as toilets, bus shelters and fences. If you see anything suspicious please report it to the police (phone 101 and ask to speak to the Duty Sergeant or Duty Inspector at Haverfordwest Police Station) or to the County Council Out-of-Hours Service – 01437 775522. Or, if you prefer, talk to the Clerk (636 668). Residents have already drawn attention to some suspicious activity and vehicles and the approach of the spring bank holiday season is a time of enhanced risk that we might again be inflicted with this nuisance. Please keep your eyes open!

One way system abuse – abuse of the one way system continues to occur – especially at the blind bend between Brook Cottage and Townsend. Residents are asked to be aware of this hazard when approaching this area and to report incidents to the Community Council (including vehicle number and date and time of incident). The Community Council continues to try to find a solution to this problem and is talking to police and Highway Authority about the options.

The Annual General Meeting of Dale Community Council will take place on Tuesday 14th May, 2013 at The Jubilee Suite at 1900hrs – it will be followed by a meeting of the Community Council. Members of the community are encouraged to attend

Marloes & St Brides CC

Report of the Marloes & St. Brides C. C. meeting held in April 2013.

Planning Matters – Cllrs Beal and Jessop reported on the National Park Seminar. They advised that attendance was low. A report had been received on the proposed County Council parking order. It is not intended to introduce charging at St. Brides, but NP staff will have greater control in case of overnight parking.

Information was given on their Wind Turbine policy, but had to be prompted about permitted development on smaller household turbines. The last report was about archaeology in the Park area. Questions raised by this Council were discussed, but not in any great detail. Agreed that the Council follow up the possibility of a design/policy statement for the Community. **NP/13/0141** – Two signs fixed to wall, Slate Mill Lodge – Members noted that these were already in place. The Council had no aesthetic objections to the design, and as there were no other properties nearby there will be no external impact. It was noted that there had been an appeal against the planning refusal for a Wind Turbine at Philbeach Farm (**NP/12/0342**). A draft letter had been circulated to all members except Cllr. Smithies, and a letter in support had been sent to the Planning Inspectorate. This Council had received no adverse comments from community residents at meetings, or in response to their Community Council reports.

Marine Conservation Zone – Council members reported that a constructive meeting had been held with Mr. Peter Davies, Chairman of the Stakeholder Group. It was noted that shortly after that meeting a change of ministerial posts meant that there was a new minister in charge of the environmental portfolio. Cllr. McDermott will be reporting on the meeting held in Milford, and further information is expected on the report to be sent to the minister by the Task and Finish Group. It was noted that Cllr. Smithies and the Clerk will be attending the annual meeting of the Skomer Marine Reserve on the 18th April. This will be held in Marloes Hall as usual.

County Council Highway & Other

Matters - An apology for absence had been received from Cllr. Owens. It was noted

that barriers had now been placed in front of the village toilets to prevent access to the disability toilets being blocked. Residents are reminded that parking within the double yellow lines will breach the parking order. Clerk to ask Cllr. Owen if the redrafted notice can be used to warn offending vehicles. It was agreed that this Council write again to the National Trust to seek a dispensation for local residents parking in the Car Park. The Clerk advised that it would be helpful if anyone who had knowledge of a similar policy in a National Trust car park elsewhere could contact the Council.

St. Brides - Cllr. Richards advised that refurbishment work has been undertaken at the St. Brides Toilets, and that the recycling bins were in place. Members were concerned to hear that vandalism had occurred in the area. The post for bicycles had been wrenched out of the ground and removed, but thankfully the Church notice board although removed had not been taken. National Park had tidied the area, and the Chairman had reported the matter to the police. Clerk advised that the NP Ranger had asked if the Council would be willing to adopt the Kiosk, and she would then seek other uses for the Box. After discussion, it was agreed that at present the Council favour the option of BT refurbishing the Box, and it remaining as a working telephone via use of a card. Ownership would mean insurance implications, and the present site of the Box can lead to vandalism problems.

Meetings – Agreed that Cllrs Beal and Twidale attend the meeting arranged by PALC on the Code of Conduct, and that the Clerk attend the County Council meeting on the proposed assistance to Councils establishing web-sites. Apologies to be sent to One Voice Wales for non attendance at their meeting.

Financial Matters – Members agreed that a payment of £50 be paid to One Voice Wales for membership of that Association. Audit papers for the year ending 31st March 2013 have been received from BDO. Clerk to prepare a timetable to allow for the Council approving the return, and for the Internal auditor to undertake scrutiny of the accounts. Members were pleased to note that the NFU had reduced the premium for the Clock Tower by £23.66 to £173.50. in response to Cllr. Smithies request. They also noted that the Council had received a fee of £25 from Lloyds Bank following an error in transferring money between accounts.

Next Meeting – This will be held on Monday 13th May when the Annual General Meeting will precede the normal Business Meeting. All members of the Community are welcome to attend, and may speak at the invitation of the Chairman.

St. Ishmaels CC

Recently discussed items include **Pembs. National Parks** No new National Parks planning application was submitted this month.

NP/12/0550 - Demolition of existing redundant greenhouses & associated buildings. Replacement of existing garden centre buildings, plus siting of 18 timber clad lodges for holiday purposes in a landscape setting. The above planning application was refused on 20th March 2013 for the following reasons: Policies 35 & 38 state static caravan or chalet sites will not be permitted notwithstanding that the site is a brownfield site. The provision of eighteen static caravans on a site not previously in use for holiday accommodation is therefore contrary to adopted Development Plan Policy. Policies 8, 15, 29 & 30 seek to protect and enhance the pattern and diversity of the

landscape and prevent development that fails to harmonise with or enhance the landform and landscape character of the National Park, that fails to incorporate traditional features, and that is insensitively and unsympathetically sited within the landscape and visually intrusive.

The application has not been submitted with a sufficient detailed landscaping plan to allow the impact of the proposal to be fully considered on the special qualities of the National Park and it is therefore considered contrary to Adopted Development Plan Policy.

Sandy Haven Crossing Draft plans have been drawn up for a bridge type crossing rather than stepping stones. The barrel stepping stones are not suitable because the bearing capacity of the beach is inadequate to hold them even on piles. The existing type is also inadequate for the desired usage prams/families/wheelchairs. The National Trail Officer is now investigating planning and consents.

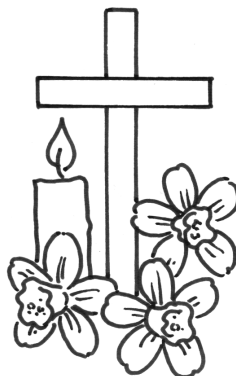

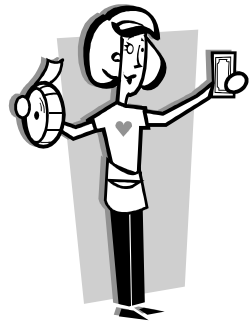

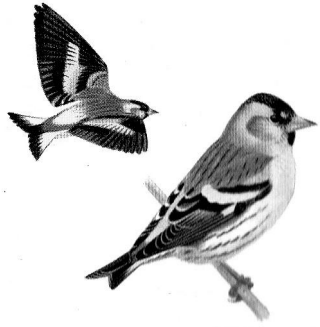

The Siskin

Before about 1970 the Siskin was not a common bird in the UK. However, two things changed that – the first was the maturation of the many new conifer plantations throughout the countryside which provided abundant seed for this cone-loving finch. The second change was the Siskin's adaption to taking food from garden feeders – initially they favoured peanuts in red netting (it is thought that these reminded them of pine cones!) but now they happily utilise all kinds of food.



The Siskin is a small finch which is heavily dependent on conifers – it usually nests high in a conifer on an outside branch and feeds almost exclusively on seeds extracted from the cones of spruce, pine and alder.

In the winter, and especially late in the winter when its source of conifer seeds is running low, or when they are migrating back through the UK on the way further north, Siskins often come to garden feeders. We have a pair of Siskins in our garden at the moment feeding mostly on the nyger seed - this is a first for us though I know other people in the areas have them regularly. I have always had a soft spot for them as when I was a post-graduate student in Birmingham we had Siskins coming to our feeders which we hung out of the window of a student flat – this was in 1972 when they had only just embarked on this new habit.

So how do you recognise a Siskin? Well, it is a very small finch, smaller than a Goldfinch and indeed smaller than many of the tits. The male is a colourful bird - predominantly greenish yellow with a smart black cap, yellow rump and with black and yellow on the wings while the female is basically greenish brown with streaked underparts, They both share a very pointed beak and a deeply forked tail.

It will be interesting to see what happens in the future to the population of Siskins in Pembrokeshire - many of the conifer plantations on which they rely have been felled, so numbers may well decrease.
